

Emory Libraries/ECDS Fellowships **Guidelines for the 2026-2027 Fellowship Year**

Applications and General Fellowships Letter of Rec. Due: December 8, 2025, 11:59pm

Virtual Info Session: Visit the LGS fellowships website, when applicable

Funded by the Laney Graduate School and the Emory Libraries, the Emory Libraries and Emory Center for Digital Scholarship will award fellowships to advanced graduate students expecting to complete their dissertations by the end of the fellowship period. Fellows will work 16 hours per week in an area relating to their subject specialization or interest.

Fellows will be centered in a specific placement area and may also have the opportunity to engage in projects across several library areas, depending on interest and expertise. Fellows will work with curators and specialists in various areas on projects such as preparing manuscript collections and rare books for research use; developing or managing a digital project in the fellow's subject area; assisting in research projects with numeric data sets; assisting in analyzing and developing library collections in a particular subject area; and supporting the development of new library research and instructional services. In April, each fellow will make a presentation on his or her fellowship project. A virtual Information Session may be held via Zoom (see LGS fellowships webpage).

The fellow will receive a 9-month stipend (September - May) along with a 100% subsidy for the Emory University Student Health Insurance Plan (EUSHIP). The first stipend payment will be at the end of September and the final payment will be at the end of May. **The current fellowships stipend rate is \$30,243 paid over 9 months.**

Applicants must meet the eligibility requirements listed below. Applications will be evaluated on the basis of the subject specialty of the dissertation and the ways in which the division's needs and the applicant's research areas would produce mutually beneficial collaborations. The goal of the fellowship is to enhance the applicant's skills in using specialized resources in research and teaching and understanding of emerging issues such as digital scholarship and scholarly communication.

Eligibility

To be considered for the fellowship, applicants must

- be full time students in a doctoral program, in good standing;
- be in candidacy at the time of application;
- be in their 7th or lower year of graduate study at the time of application; and
- may not previously have held an Emory completion fellowship. Unless otherwise noted, the fellowships listed on <http://www.gs.emory.edu/professional-development/fellowships/advanced.html> are all considered completion fellowships (exceptions include ORDER fellowships, PRISM fellowships, SIRE for the natural sciences, and some OUCP and grant fellowships).

Application Materials

1. **CV/Resume** of no more than two pages
2. **Statement of Purpose to include:**
 - a) the library placement area(s) of interest and how the library placement area will enhance the applicant's skills in research and teaching, **and**
 - b) a brief description of the dissertation research, including progress thus far
3. **Application Skills Summary** (see pages 4-6 of this document)
4. **Letter of Recommendation** from an Emory faculty member, preferably the dissertation director, who is familiar with the applicant and the dissertation. The letter should address the applicant's schedule for

completing the dissertation, and assess the likelihood that the applicant would complete by the end of the fellowship year.

IF THIS IS YOUR FIRST FELLOWSHIP (non-DTF) APPLICATION SUBMISSION: The LaneyConnect system will allow you to select your recommender and they will receive email notification of your request. If you already had a fellowship LoR submitted: the system will populate your application with your previously submitted LoR. Your recommender only needs to submit the letter once this year across all fellowships (only exception is DTF, which has a separate process). This means that your letter writer only needs to write one general letter of support and should not mention any specific fellowship (unless you intend to apply for one fellowship only this year).

Please note that the system will generally take between 1-3 hours from your submission to generate the email link to your letter writer. So please plan accordingly. All files (including the LoR) must be submitted by the posted deadline.

Application Submission

All nominations and applications, including supporting materials, will be uploaded using LaneyConnect <https://laneyconnect.emory.edu/manage/login?realm=&r=/portal/laney-connect-hub>.

The portal may not yet be active but when it is activated:

1. Select the appropriate fellowship from the list and follow the upload fields. The application will not let you proceed until you upload all the necessary materials. And it will not save incomplete applications so please be sure to have all materials and information ready to upload/complete.
2. If you are applying for multiple fellowships, you may select several at one time and submit all materials for the fellowships you intend to apply for (it will not save progress, however, so you must complete your session). Or you may access the portal later and add additional fellowship(s), if eligible, and submit required files for the new fellowship(s) selected (and click "Update" in the online form to complete this process).

In the LaneyConnect application portal, if the applicant has already submitted files that are standard requirements (e.g., transcript), they will not submit it again for a different fellowship. It will pull from the already uploaded file and be included in all fellowship application(s) that require this file. This means that students will submit standard files only once and can focus on documents such as the 'statement of purpose' which will be specific for each fellowship that requires this document. Terms of Fellowship

Fellows who are awarded and accept the fellowship award agree to commit to the course teaching load or the general hours/week and responsibilities as described in the sections above. Fellows who do not uphold the requirements of the fellowship may have the fellowship revoked and may lose their funding and EUSHIP subsidy for the remainder of the fellowship term.

Please note that in cases where there are partner units involved, the fellow is responsible for responding to the fellowship director/coordinator in a timely manner and is expected to fulfill the responsibilities as outlined by the original fellowship call. If the student is unable to communicate and respond in a timely manner or is unable to fulfill those responsibilities, their stipend (and EUSHIP subsidy) may be withheld or the fellowship slot may be removed. In some fellowships, the fellow is expected to begin their role around mid/late-August.

When applicable, this fellowship award replaces other graduate school stipend and scholarship funding* a student may have been scheduled to receive for the fellowship year, and the eligibility for that funding cannot be reserved to be used in a subsequent year.

*This does not apply to smaller awards such as WiNS, Centennial, or ARCS Foundation awards.

All LGS fellows will be required to submit an intake form and an outgoing form as part of this fellowship. These forms will be shared by the LGS PDCP office sometime in late Spring 2026 and 2027, respectively.

Fellows who receive offers for other awards must contact the Laney Graduate School PDCP Office (LGS.profdev@emory.edu) to determine whether the two awards may be held concurrently. Please include with this email full details about the other award you may be inquiring about.

In general, external fellowship awards may not be held concurrently with LGS completion/advanced fellowship awards.

Please note: Unless indicated otherwise, **all** LGS fellowships require on-site in-person participation and completion. There are no remote options available unless explicitly indicated.

Award Notifications

Awardee will be notified sometime between Dec-Jan.

This notification period will also include students who were not selected for the fellowship.

Descriptions of Emory Libraries/ECDS Graduate Fellowship Placements for 2026-2027

Data Services and Digital Humanities Fellow

Fellows in the **Emory Center for Digital Scholarship (ECDS)** (2 fellows—**Data Services** and **Digital Humanities**) will support projects in digital scholarship, computer-based research, and electronic publishing such as ECDS open access digital publications, born-digital multimedia projects, and digital archives. ECDS Fellows will collaborate with interdisciplinary teams of researchers, librarians, writers, and technologists; and they will serve as project researchers, content administrators, editorial associates, and reviewers for the academic year. Fellows will learn about changing practices, platforms, and products of digital scholarship and gain training in project development, project management, developmental editing, online presentation, and digital archiving. Fellows selected for this placement will have an interest in digital scholarship, interdisciplinary collaboration, and an eagerness to acquire new technological skills. The **Digital Humanities** fellow's work will involve serving as a member of the editorial team of *Southern Spaces*, an interdisciplinary digital journal. Students with strong backgrounds in the humanities, an interest in regional studies, and experience with editing, digital publishing, operations, and project management are particularly encouraged to apply. The **Data Services** fellowship focuses mainly on providing consultations and support for students and faculty making use of such data for their research, such as helping them locate data or helping them clean data to make them usable. Students with strong backgrounds in using quantitative data and/or GIS (Geographic Information Systems) for research in the social sciences and/or public health are strongly encouraged to apply.
