## Possible paper topics include:

- Investigations of how religion, along with culture, ethnicity, race, and class might complicate the internationalization of human rights concepts as applied to women
- The potential for feminist theory to contribute to the acceptance of women's rights as part of basic human rights
- Exploration of areas of intersection and negotiation between human rights and women's positions within Islam
- The contours of Islamic family law
- The meanings of marriage and divorce in Islam
- · How Islam addresses women's sexuality
- The impact of "new wave feminism" on Islamic and Muslim feminists
- The limitations of Human Rights discourse, as well as other theoretical discourses, when it comes to women in fundamentalist religious societies
